Hello,

I receive e-mails from many organisations on a daily basis. More and more of them are using MailChimp for the e-shots. I have looked at the raw source code of some of these mails, and it is clear that MailChimp gathers personal information without my permission – in particular whether I opened the mail and whether I clicked on any of the links. Since I cannot tell, before opening the mail, whether the mail has been sent via MailChimp, I have no way of protecting myself from this data-collection practice.

I have recently also been able to see MailChimp from the other side – a colleague was sending out an e-shot using MailChimp. And there indeed, after an e-shot had been sent, was a list of all the e-mail addresses and whether each recipient had opened the e-mail.

I doubt MailChimp is the only mailshot program that gathers data in this way.

I would be grateful if you could let me know whether this behaviour by MailChimp / the users of MailChimp is legal.

I refer to your recent email to this Office.

I have examined the website in question and note that the website appears to be based outside our jurisdiction (Atlanta Georgia USA). We generally advise individuals to make a request to the website directly seeking the removal of their information and provide the url of the page in question but as the MailChimp website appears to be operating from a country outside our office's jurisdiction, our office will have no way of enforcing your request should they not comply with it as they are not subject to the Irish Data Protection Acts. Dear Mr. Fitzgerald

Thank you for your further email to this office. I would like to add the the following information for clarification purpose.

If an Irish based organisation is providing personal email addresses of its customers to a provider for the purpose of distributing an email newsletter, it would be considered the Data Controller (DC) in the situation and mailchimp would be a data processor (DP). Therefore the Irish based organisation would be required to have an appropriate DC/DP contract in place with mailchimp to outline the exact nature of processing they can do on their behalf and the security measurements they would have while holding/processing the information. Should you wish to specify the Irish organisation(s) which you feel are providing your data to the data processor, based outside of this jurisdiction, we may be able to review the issue more thoroughly. You should include details of specific instances in your reply.

Thank you for your response, Stewart. It gets into technicalities I find hard to follow, I'm afraid. I do also appreciate that I may be asking questions about a practice that is entirely allowable. It just seems to me like it shouldn't be.

If you don't mind, I do have three questions and one point:

- 1 Is it allowable in this country for me to send you for example an e-mail and receive automatic notification as to whether, when and how often you looked at it, and whether you clicked on any links in it, without your knowing and without your permission?
- 2 Does it matter whether the e-mail is a one off from myself, or part of a mailshot?
- 3 Do the answers to the above (1 and 2) change if I route through a server outside of Ireland, although I'm in Ireland?
- 4 I am attaching a quick analysis I did a few days ago by opening an account myself of how MailChimp works and examples of its use in Ireland. I would call it spyware, but I'm no expert in the area. [see mailChimp attachment]

I hope I am not being a nuisance, and look forward to a reply.
